In honor of Lutheran Schools week, CLEF is offering a brief pop quiz in history. Question: What Lutheran tradition is over 500 years old? Answer: Lutheran Education! Thanks to Martin Luther, education and literacy are now considered universal rights. Rights first championed by Luther, and faithfully followed by future generations of Lutheran educators.

Today more than 1,200 early childhood centers and preschools are operated by congregations and Christian day schools within the Lutheran tradition. Additionally, our congregations operate 880 elementary schools which serve approximately 113,000 students.

Students Served

Located in the beautiful-tree lined Sheffield neighborhood of Lincoln Park, St. James has 211 students enrolled from early childhood to eighth grade. The school graduates students to Chicago's best high schools.

CLEF recently supported the school's rebranding efforts with a marketing grant. This rebrand is reflected in the school's new logo which emphasizes to parents:

- Your first choice in Lincoln Park
- Your first choice for inquiry-based learning
- Your first choice to find the perfect Chicago high school



St. James Lutheran School Your first choice.

Did you know? St. James is the oldest, continuously operating school in Chicago. It occupied as many as five buildings in Lincoln Park between its formation by a small group of German immigrants in 1857.

Today, St. James has become one of the leading private schools on the city's North Side. Promoting an inquiry-based approach to teaching and learning, St. James emphasizes intellectual engagement and helps to foster a deeper understanding through the development of a hands-on and minds-on experience by the student.

Inquiry-based learning is on display during the highly anticipated project week when teachers ask students to work toward a culminating experience or capstone to a project. In one recent venture, eighth graders undertook a school improvement activity, researching vendors and helping plan the addition of a painted bicycle path on the playground. On any given snow-free day, you can find younger students pedaling with joy on this new bike path. The school emphasizes social-emotional learning and has added resources including a new sensory room and school counselor to support its social-emotional learning initiatives.

Students love the after-school program offerings such as art, cooking and drama classes. There is something for parents too, with workshops on topics including nutrition, internet safety and social-emotional learning.

"Every new family has a mentor," says Sue Dees, Director of Admissions. "The parent advocate sets up a play date with their children and invites them to school events."

Clearly their model is working. With a 94% retention rate each year, there are now wait lists at many grade levels. The caring teachers and excellent administrative staff proudly say, *Together, we can prepare your child to love learning, love God and love others*.

CLEF COACHES CHEER ON EDUCATORS

For the past three years, CLEF has provided instructional coaching as part of the Pathways to Excellence program. Our newly appointed Director of Academic Excellence Rachel Swanson has the privilege of coordinating educational resources directly with our coaches. This has allowed CLEF greater ability to immediately respond to school needs and deploy people and resources appropriately. CLEF has five exceptional instructional coaches that go into schools weekly, working directly with teachers and principals to support their instructional goals. Welcome to our coaches: Kim Peterz Dent, Jennifer Heinze, Erika Jackson, Dr. Della Weaver and Maggie Zampini. To give an insight into why coaches are passionate about helping their fellow educators, we recently talked to one of the CLEF coaches.



Meet Coach Jennifer

As her career path attests, Jennifer Heinze loves Lutheran schools. She began teaching at St. Philip Lutheran School in Chicago in the mid-80s, before moving to Saint Paul in Mt. Prospect. After serving as a teacher and assistant principal for 15 years, she was promoted to principal where she served for another 15 years until her recent retirement.

Jennifer is delighted to support Bethesda International Academy, Good Shepherd Christian Academy and St. Phillip Lutheran School this year as an instructional coach consultant for CLEF.

What is your favorite part of coaching teachers?

I love meeting the people who are doing this important work in Lutheran Schools and seeing how they do it! The teachers are passionate and dedicated and have great ideas about how to serve their own communities. Lutheran schools are accomplishing God's work, in their own way. There's no "one-size-fits-all" Lutheran school, but we share a common goal: to be missionaries to the neighborhoods in which God's placed us. I'm happy to assist as schools work on their School Improvement Plans. Maintaining excellence in schools is an excellent witness to our Lord.

What are three quick tips you always share with educators?

1. You're teaching KIDS as well as teaching the SUBJECT. We can't ever forget that in order to reach kids with content, we have to connect with THEM, and help them connect the info with their experience. It's an art and science, but it is a joy to watch when you see a teacher who is in the sweet spot.

2. A favorite saying: Prepare the child for the path, not the other way around. Learning doesn't happen without a little bit of frustration and helping kiddos overcome obstacles builds resilience.

3. Attention from a teacher has the power to lift a sad, struggling kiddo to a better place. It doesn't cost money, and a little bit each day can go a long way. When a child is having social problems and having a hard time connecting with peers, a teacher who notices, affirms, or intervenes and instructs socially can be lifesaving. Literally. A teacher's attention may be the only reason a kiddo wants to come to school some days. We've got to "love 'em up" so they can face their world.

How do you motivate teachers to strive for the excellence in the classroom?

We have to remind ourselves how exciting this is: We're preparing kids for jobs that may not even exist yet.

Nothing is static, so we can't teach that way. We have to make sure that kids know the right things to navigate the world and adjust to its changes. Kids need to be allowed flexibility in thinking, and we need to model that. All the content areas are important including history, which helps give context to the dynamics of a changing world and marketplace. Training a nimble mind is a big responsibility....but exciting. Teachers need to bring their best game every day

What is your favorite Bible quote?

1 Thessalonians 5:11: Therefore encourage one another and build one another up, just as you are doing.



Beyond the classroom, Jennifer and her fellow church members at Saint Paul are wonderful role models as servant leaders. Jennifer saw a need at Bethesda International Academy to clean up their exterior grounds and enlisted fellow church volunteers. In a weekend, they transformed the exterior to beautify the grounds.

Throughout the school year, urban and suburban Lutheran schools gather to share experiences and learn from each other. While students may come from different backgrounds and live far apart, they do have one thing in common. They both attend Christian schools where they are learning to live a Christcentered life. Stirred to Love pairs urban and suburban school students thanks to the collaboration of CLEF and the Northern Illinois District (NID).

"Christ the King School has the unique opportunity to celebrate the love of Christ with our fellow Stirred to Love partners," says Geri Brazeal, Christ the King principal. "We're blessed with experiences which create a spirit of unity, a sharing of ideas and best practices as staffs and children interact in many different situations. Another blessing is how many of the students make life-long friendships with children from other Christian schools."
